
> Amon Carter, Fort Worth, Texas. My Dear Mr Carter:

CHRISTIAN POISE IN A WORLD OF PANIC

We live in headline excitement to day as the aggressor's sword cuts a wider swath, and tyranny marches relentlessly on. Multitudes are afraid, but the Christian, even in these chaotic days, though at times confused, can experience confidence and poise.

Last week I saw the sun, like a great ball of fire, sink beneath the horizon, black, heavy clouds moved threateningly across the sky. Darkness came on, and the storm seemingly angry at the earth, began to lash with wind and rain everything in its path. The pext morning 1 saw the same sun emerge over the horizon and east its brilliant rays of golden light across the world. How like life that is, -- fading light, glowering clouds, the dark, the storm, and then a new and glorious day! Can we not have faith that the God who gives us the storm, will also give us sunshine on the morrow?

A while ago I received a letter from a loyal member of bur church, a loyalty expressed by generous giving and consistent attendance at worship.
