Dear Mr. Carter:

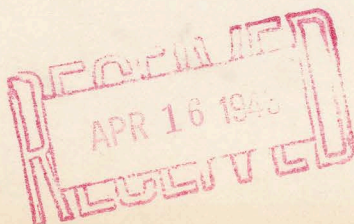
