To: The Directors

Attached are some figures which will interest you, indicating trend of our business for several years. The rate for transportation has been going down, generally, and the cost of providing transportation has been going up. This increases the percentage of potential load required to break even. The first break in this trend has come this year; the result principally of higher rates and more efficient equipment, but with the important factor of reduced cost by increased efficiency of operation.

It is evident that the expense of doing business continues to rise. Offsetting that to some extent is the increasing number, and relative percentage, of DC6 airplanes in service.
