Summary of the Minutes of the Special Meeting of the Board of Directors of American Airlines, Inc. Held January 8, 1945

There were present at the meeting: Directors Benedict, Bruce, Butler, Damon, Hovey, Kemp, Mosier and Rheinstrom.

- 1. The minutes of the previous meeting, held December 9, 1944, were approved.
- 2. The Comptroller presented financial statements prepared as of November 30, 1944.
- 3. The Directors approved capital expenditures authorized by the management amounting to \$79,290.66 and authorized a capital expenditure of \$31,119.00 to complete the installation of standard instrument panels on up to 100 DC-3 type airplanes.
- 4. The action of the management in having executed delivery agreements for five DC-3 aircraft obtained from the U. S. Government and having deposited \$16,000 per airplane as advance rental was ratified and approved.

The management was authorized to acquire additional DC-3 type airplanes either by lease or purchase on such basis as in their judgment may be in the best interests of the corporation, to bring the DC-3 fleet up to a total of 110 airplanes.

- 5. The Directors authorized entering into a lease for 20,000 square feet of storage space at 37-01 31st Street, Long Island City, New York, for a term of 35 months commencing February 1, 1945, at a rental of \$16,000 per annum.
- 6. The Chairman reported that the management had been making studies of future earnings and of prospective fare and rate reductions which had now been revised in the light of the CAB order of January 1, 1945, to show cause why mail rates should not be reduced from 60 cents to 32 cents per ton mile. A further general order of investigation into rates governing the transportation of property was instituted by the CAB.

The Chairman said that, due to the importance of the matter, he had wished to discuss it with the Directors and to report the management's plans to answer the show cause order objecting to the proposed reduction of mail rates and giving notice of intention to file passenger fare reductions of $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent to be effective about March 1, 1945. It was contemplated that the Board would be asked in such answer either to vacate or to modify the show cause order to take into account the passenger fare adjustment.
