Amon G. Carter's refusal to give his resignation as chairman of the board of directors of West Texas Technological college at the request of Mrs. Gov. Ferguson is but a gesture.

He now places himself in position to allow the public to witness an unique spectacle — a woman booting a man out of office.

For, of course, that is what Mrs. Ferguson will do. Mr. Carter having refused to avail himself of the opportunity to resign, she will discharge him.

Meanwhile she has had the rare pleasure of accusing him of sundry things relating to his personal conduct.

By way of reply, he counter-charges that Mrs. Ferguson's accusations were but an effort to divert public attention from the state highway department disclosures.
