AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 30.—Resignation of Amon G. Carter, as a member of the board of directors of the West Texas Technological College, was requested in a letter today by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson.

The letter assures the task is unpleasant to the governor and states that she is informed that in December last year Carter "fitted up a building owned or controlled by you (perhaps a garage building) in the old fashioned barroom way, providold fashioned barroom way, providing a bar with the foot rail and the sawdust on the floor and behind the bar you had a man dressed in the old-fashioned bar tender white apron style" for the Old Men's Association in Lant Westling in Lant Westli Fort Worth. in

"To this place I am informed that you invited some two ar three hundrede guests and to those who came, you dispensed drinks that were to say the least stimulating and that you caused to be given away souvenir canes in which there is a hidden vial some 30 inches in length that contained approximately one pint of beverage," the letter reads. "I have one of the canes in my possession which I am reliably informed came from your place. The governor's letter continued: "You, of course, remember yo "You, of course, remember your being at College Station on Thanksgiving day of last week upon the oc-casion of the annual football contest between the A. & M. College and the University. If you do not remember, I can inform you that it was an imposing meeting of some 25,000 some imposing meeting of some 25,000 people from all parts of the state and there were thousands of young boys and girls, students and friends of both of these two great institutions, the pride of our state.

"I see from the papers that you admit that many times you cheered for Hon Day Moody and the A and

for Hon. Dan Moody and the A. and M. team. I can verify that you are correct in this statement, as you the A. and correct in this statement, as you were right behind the box that I was occupying, and on two occasion: when you gave vent to your vociferous exclamations you were only a few feet from me. I believe your statement when you say in the name few feet from me. I believe you statement when you say in the pa pers that you were not aware of m presence and that you meant no per sonal discourtesy to me. You know friends who know you best a me (and I believe them) that you are in a normal condition your are a courteous gentlema the manner born, and I attr gentleman

your seeming accent to your unusual condition and the influence under which you were laboring at the time. In your state it was but natural for you to have been unable distinguish between a colonel dressed in khaki, yellow, staff, and a town policeman, dressed who, under orders from authorities ejected you fr blue, who, unae local authorities the grounds in the interest of public peace. No member of my staff laid hands on you as suggested by you in the public press. Personally I gladly forget any apparent dis-courtesy to me and from my own observation I know you were not responsible at the time. But your actions involve a great principle and a matter of sound public policy

a matter of sound parameter of sound which I cannot overlook.

"We have on the statute books a law against the unlawful sale, transor possession of intoxicating liquors. Also there is a la against intoxication in public plac Lauds Educational Institutions is a law lic places.

"It will not be denied that the foundation of our civilization is our educational institutions. In and educational institutions. In and around these temples of knowledge from the country school to the college and the University we seek to teach the rising generation the virtue of morality, sobriety and correct living. It is here that the proper precepts and example is set or should be set before the young boys and girls that will aid them to become good and intelligent citizens. These simple truths are so self-evifent that to state them is to prove them.

"If those in charge of thagement and direction of our the educational institutions shall be their personal deportment display these vices that are repugnant to the idea of strict morality and sobriety, then such result in the students of these institutions cannot be expected. If as head of the board of the West as head of the board of the West Texas Technological College you re-serve to yourself the right to appear in public in the condition you were in at College Station on Thanksgiv-ing day, then every student who saw you could justify him or herself for doing the same thing. If a student at Tech College should appear on the Lubhock campus as you appear. the Lubbock campus as you appeared in College Station the faculty ed in College Station the faculty would promptly expel such student from the college. And yet in such case the student could plead your case and the example and the predendent set by you in justification. If the heads of our institutions cannot practice and preach solviety not not practice and preach sobriety then our hopes for educated citizen-

ip are vain and useless.
It is with deep regret that I protegate against your further occupying place on the West Texas Technocical board. I plead for a better est against a place on th logical board. example for our boys and girls. You have set a standard that cannot be tolerated. For th good of the public affirm service emphatically you should send me your resigna-
