

Watahatchie, Tex.  
June 28, 1881

My dear Sallie:

Bro. Miller  
will start for AdRan tomorrow.  
I send you a silver set of Knives  
& forks, and spoons. I bought  
them of bro. Pol. They are  
genuine. I just this min-  
ute learned that he is going,  
or I would have sent  
some thing to the children.  
I may get some thing yet  
in town this evening. It is  
now five o'clock. I received  
card from Jesse today - written  
Sunday. I hope he got off  
all right. I do wish that  
I could go to the State  
Meeting, but I cant get  
off from the meeting

at Italy. I wish I knew  
whether father and mother  
have gone to Wallas. How  
I do wish that I could  
take Bro. Miller's place.

He says he will be back  
Friday. Cant you send me  
one of the children? But  
then you cant get along  
without any of them unless  
it is little sister, and she  
is too little to leave home.  
You must bundle up  
a dozen stisses and send  
them along. I am a little  
wetter of my trouble to-day.  
Preaching is rather an up-  
hill business with me  
now. Wont know whether  
I shall accomplish anything  
here or not. There is not  
much being done any where  
in the religious field this

Summer. The people  
seem to be almost wholly  
unconcerned. They are  
turning out very well  
to hear, but do not seem  
to be much impressed.

We can not tell, however,  
in three sermons what  
can be done. I forgot  
to ask Bro. Miller whether  
he is going in a wagon.  
If I knew that he is I  
would try to get Charles  
Wagon and send it to  
him. I will not see  
him any more till meeting  
to night.
