two collars each to you and  
sister. I send brother a water-  
thim. It is very nice.

Tell the other children that I  
will remember them when I  
come home. I am not so sur-  
prised now that I will go to Aradde.  
I don't hear anything more from  
there. What a thing dear here  
got. I have not seen very well  
for a few days - a little billious.  
I took a dose of pills last  
night and am feeling better  
to day. I don't believe that  
I have given any of you  
a description of my trip to

the country. I will do so  
in my next to sister.  
We are having meeting day and  
night this week. I expect to  
leave here next Friday, and go  
out to Bro. Dabney's, and may  
stay over there till after Sunday.  
If so, I shall perhaps not go  
to Aradde.

I am doing so little good  
in this country, that I am  
becoming very much disengaged.  
I do hope that you all  
will sleep well.

Tell bro. Bill that I wrote  
him a long letter, which ought  
to have reached several days  
before he was there inquiring  
for me.
