

FERGUSON QUIZ STARTS JAN. 4

FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 1 (AP).—Amon G. Carter, chairman of the board of directors of the Texas Technological College, whose resignation was requested Monday by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, will not accede to her request, he announced today. He denied all the charges made by the governor.

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 1 (AP).—Threats to call a special session of the Texas legislature to investigate the administration of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson have turned to action.

Lee Satterwhite, speaker of the house and leader of the forces demanding the session, announced at Amarillo that he will call the lower house to assemble January 4. The call will be made public December 20.

DOESN'T FEAR INQUIRY.

His action followed a reported statement of Governor Ferguson, given in an interview with a newspaper correspondent, that she would not call the demanded special session.

"I am not going to throw myself to the wolves who want to gather here and tear me apart," she is quoted by a correspondent of the Baltimore Sun. "Let them assemble if they want to," the interview continued. "Let them start something. I'll still be here when they finish."

Fifty members of the legislature recently presented to the governor a petition demanding that she call a special session by December 16.

\$300,000 SUBSCRIBED.

There was no question about the legality of paying the expenses of the session out of a fund raised by subscription. Speaker Satterwhite said. Under the law the legislators will be prevented from making an appropriation to cover the cost of the session. It has been announced that \$300,000 has been subscribed to defray the cost of the session.

Rev. Atticus Webb, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League in Texas, challenged the governor to "make good" her offer of last Saturday of a \$500 reward for the conviction of liquor law violators worth more than \$5000.
