

GERMAN TROOPS ON THE MOVE Arrival on Czech-Polish Frontier DANZIG NAZI CHIEF'S DECLARATION

The City Must Return to Reich "Some Day"

LAN troop reinforcements are reported to have arrived at former Czech-Polish frontier. Barbed-wire entanglements erected, and quantities of fortification material are near Maerisch-Ostrau.

Foerster, the Nazi leader in Danzig, in an open-air speech yesterday, declared that Danzig would come back to the same day. He added: "Danzig men know how to use force, when called upon, to do so."

WARSAW GOVERNMENT STILL CONSIDERING PROTEST

Warsaw Government is still considering the nature of relations to be made to the Danzig Senate against the military occupation of the Free City.

Britain and France will probably be associated with these relations, but no joint demarche in Berlin is at present contemplated.

STATEMENT IN COMMONS TO-DAY?

Chamberlain is almost certain to make a declaration on the House of Commons to-day, and he will leave no doubt that Danzig is covered by Britain's pledges to Poland, and attempt from inside or the outside to alter the status of the City by force will immediately bring Britain to Poland's aid. The French Government have been consulted, and are in full accord with this reaffirmation of promises.

Mr. Raczynski, the Polish Ambassador, flew back to London after important consultations with his Government. He conveyed the Polish views on the Danzig situation to Lord Halifax. It will be after this interview that the final decision as to whether or not the Premier will make his statement to-day will be known.

NEGOTIATIONS

negotiations for a three-Power pact were resumed in London on Saturday and yesterday, but, according to a statement issued to-day by the official Tass Agency, they "produced no result."

Chodacki, the Polish Commissioner in Danzig. "If M. Chodacki," he said, "thinks to rule Danzig he has made his mistake. There are no more laurels for him and nothing left to harvest. If he does not like it he can get out."

DR. GOEBBELS MAY COME TO DANZIG

Herr Foerster concluded his speech with an assurance that Danzig would come back to the Reich "some day"; but his address left the impression that it was a matter of much less urgency than it had been two weeks ago.

The rumour that Herr Hitler will come to Danzig on the cruiser Koenigsberg next month seems to be unfounded. On the other hand, it is probable that Dr. Goebbels will pay a visit during the Zoppot Forest opera season, which this year includes "The Ring" and "Tannhauser." Dr. Goebbels is well known as a Wagner enthusiast.

Herr Greiser, President of the Free City, returned yesterday from his three weeks' naval training to resume his duties here.

The American Ambassador to Warsaw, Mr. J. Biddle, is at present paying an unofficial visit to Danzig.

Golf Ball Among The Eggs

Incident That Led to a Protest

Mr. J. B. Moyes, a Perth golfer, played a shot on Craigie Hill (Perth) course recently, and his ball finished among some partridge eggs. Thereafter he was the innocent victim of a misunderstanding.

The Scottish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, it is understood, has lodged a protest against what is described as Mr. Moyes's action in "playing a stroke from a partridge nest."

The steward of the Craigie Hill Club told a reporter yesterday that Mr. Moyes's ball finished among some partridge eggs at the back of the green. The eggs had apparently been removed by children, for the nest was twenty yards away from where they were found. The eggs were cold, and it is obvious that they had been forsaken by the bird, but the green-keeper removed them from around the ball to allow Mr. Moyes to play a chip shot.

Mr. Moyes is not the first golfer to be confronted by such a problem. Perhaps the most unusual incident of the kind recorded in the "Golfers' Handbook" concerns a Mrs. Blackford at Crawfordsville, Indiana, in 1923.

An approach shot landed in a bird's nest in a tree, and the player, after climbing the tree and taking a precarious stance among the branches, played a pitch shot to the green and halved the hole. It is not known whether the nest was empty at the time.

The Treasure of Dendra Discoveries in a Minoan Tomb

FROM "THE TIMES" ATHENS CORRESPONDENT

Professor Axel Persson, of the University of Upsala, who is excavating at Dendra, in Argolis, has made highly interesting archaeological discoveries in a rock-cut tomb of the Minoan period.

The finds include:— Ten gold plates, a number of gold necklaces, a gold cup weighing 98 grammes (just over 3 ounces), eight gold rosettes belonging to a belt, two gold ornaments, either brooches or earrings; a gold Minoan ring depicting two women, and a number of silver articles; a pentagonal agate seal depicting on one side an ibex and on the other side a lion attacking an ibex and another agate seal showing a wild boar; some thousand pieces of amber, many pieces of chryselephantine jewellery, two large and beautifully decorated Minoan pots which it has been possible to reconstruct, and much other pottery.

The excavations have now ended for the summer. Work will be resumed in October when the Crown Prince of Sweden goes to come to Greece to be present at the opening of five more tombs in the Acropolis of ancient Midea.
