Dear Mr. Dunbar:

Your letter of May 3rd received May 17th and like most of my mail is unanswered, not through lack of appreciation but because it is physically impossible.

I was delighted to hear from you, although not surprised to know that you had gone back to your own firm. I had understood there had been a number of changes in the various governmental departments and felt that sooner or later you would desire to return to your own organization. I hope that you are thoroughly happy back in the harness.

I appreciated your kindly interest and good wishes for Amon Junior, who incidentally is interned at Rotenberg, 24 miles Southeast of Kassel. We have had two letters and three cards from him and despite the fact that he has been laid up several weeks with jaundice, has lost about forty pounds of weight and asks for numerous items of food and personal articles, his letters indicate that he is in good spirits. He states that he is getting along all right, not to worry as he is being treated fine. The last letter was dated April 25th, Easter Sunday, and arrived here May 28th. He stated he would write me on May 5th (they are permitted to write 2 letters and three cards a month) so I am anxiously waiting from day to day to receive the letter.

There are 141 American Officers and 11 American Doctors, as well as some 400 British and Australian Officers (some of whom have been there since the fall of France) in that particular camp. The American Red Cross advise that the International Red Cross, through Geneva, is delivering a package of food parcels once a week to each prisoner. In the packages, we are permitted to send by the Government



regulations - 11 pounds each 60 days - we try to send as many things as possible that Amon has requested and at the same time take into consideration the items included in the Red Cross packages.

Amon Junior makes friends with everyone and I am sure he will make the best of the situation and get along fine with his captors. His letters would indicate that he is trying to sell his associates on Texas when the war is over.

Everything is loving along in fine shape so let's hope the war will soon be over and all these boys can returned to their home and loved ones.
