LACK OF PROPER DISCIPLINE DURING FORMATIVE YEARS RESULTS IN SPOILED CHILD--Sacrifices of Mothers and Fathers to ease children's way through life often defeats their purpose.

There are some things parents are not called upon to stand for and one of them is the impudence some adolescent boys and girls give their long-suffering parents. Of course those children were not properly disciplined during their formative years, but that is water under the bridge now and the fact must be faced.

Usually such children live in comfortable homes where material things ran ahead of spiritual understanding. Father and mother gave the children everything. Their smallest wish was law. Mother served the children and father paid the bills. Nothing, nothing whatever, was asked of the children save their affection. And that is the best possible recipe for the cultivation of ill-mannered adolescent children.

WHAT CAN a mother do with a girl of 16 who shouts at her, "How often do I have to tell you I don't want my toast made two slices at a time. Why don't you use your brains?"

When the young lady was asked why she said such a thing as that to her mother, she said, "That's what we are told in school--use your brains." Beyond that she had no conception of the affront she offered her mother. She did not know that she had shown grave disrespect to her mother, displayed deplorable ignorance of what is known as good breeding, and broken one of the Commandments. She showed no sense of having outraged her mother's affection for her. She simply knew no better.

What is the mother to do now that her life is made miserable, her home unhappy, by her child's attitudes and bad manners? It seems to me that such a girl or boy, and boys are as like to be untrained as the girls--should be sent to a good boarding school. They would have to live among strangers who would not stand for such manners, nor such impudence, and where they would be trained to a better understanding of their own place and importance in the scheme of things. Mothers and fathers sacrificing themselves to spoil their children are a tragic picture. They tremble in the presence of their children's displeasure. They fear to cross them lest they run away. Where will they go? Where can they go to get the same comfort they find at home?

Stop spoiling them; stop giving them service; stop treating them as helpless children. Shove them off on their own feet and make them learn what it costs to put two slices of toast on their plates, and they'll stop talking such nonsense.

Best of all, train children early to know that home is not a boarding-house, but a partnership based on love and service. It is the spoiled, selfish, discontented, rude, irresponsible child who becomes the bad husband or wife. Training for marriage begins in the cradle.
