Your letter of March 26th, received making inquiry about a letter and picture which you sent to Mr. Carter in February, received and I am really embarrassed that they had not been returned to you more promptly.

At the time your letter arrived Mr. Carter was out of the city and the mail accumulated during his absence was placed on his desk for attention. He has been so busy that he had not gotten around to reading all of it much less acknowledging it. So, when your letter arrived this morning I dug it out and return it herewith as it can be well appreciated how much all your son's letters mean to you. It was generous and thoughtful of you to permit Mr. Carter to read your son's letter and to see the picture; however, Lt. Meadow, who brought a set of these pictures with him at the time he was repatriated, had already sent Mr. Carter a picture like that sent by your son.

As yet Mr. Carter has had no word about his son and he is very anxious and worried over the situation at this time and as to just where the members of Oflag 64 may be. We have had so many conflicting reports that it is difficult to know what the true status is.

Mr. Carter and all of us are very happy that your son is on his way home and hope he will arrive in the States very soon.
