Dear Mr. and Mrs. Erwin:

Your letter of February 14th received and I am glad that it was possible to send you any information about your son who is interned in the same prisoner of war camp, Oflag 64, as my son, because we are always delighted to get any bit of news about Amon Junior from every available source.

Saturday another telegram was received from Senator Connally as follows: "Have ascertained from Provost Marshal General they have advices as of first week in February that at that time the members of Oflag 64 were still on the move west but the Department does not know where." It is my own personal opinion that we will probably not know their whereabouts until the war is over and they are liberated by the Allies for the Germans will keep these boys moving as long as there is any place to move. Naturally, it is the most disturbing and troublesome time of any period since I've known that Amon Junior was a prisoner of war, still all we can do is wait and hope and pray that these boys will come through all right.

I shall be glad to pass along any information received and will likewise appreciate hearing from you should you have any news.
