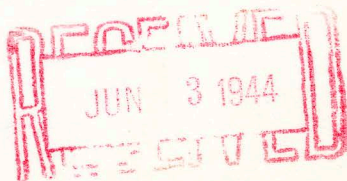
Dear Mr. Carter:

Missing Officer Reported Prisoner

Capt. Hugo Fielschmidt, son of Mrs. Fannie Fielschmidt, 1730 Collin street, Dallas, who was reported missing in action in Italy during the War Department in April, 1941, arrived in a German man prison, according to a letter received by his mother.

While no official report of his capture reached Dallas, the message from Captain Fielschmidt is a prisoner of war came in a letter from Lt. Amon Carter Jr. to his father, Amon Carter, Fort Worth newspaper publisher.

In his letter from a German camp where he also is a prisoner, tenant Carter reported that the Dallas captain and 100 other officers had reached his camp on April 23. He wrote that all the newly arrived prisoners were in good physical condition.

Captain Fielschmidt was a practicing dentist here before receiving his commission in the Army Dental Corps March 10, 1941. He has served overseas two years.

His wife lives in Boston, Mass.
