Under separate cover, parcel post,  
we are sending you a package containing:

Fruit Cake (Hoenshel)	\$1.75
Dates, 1 Lb	.69
Table Salt	.25
Package Oatmeal	.17
Biscuit Mix	.12
Corn Muffin Mix	.12
2 Pkgs. Beef Noodle Soup Mix	.20
12 ounces Nescafe in a push in tin container	1.19

This package's contents weigh approximately 6  $\frac{3}{4}$  pounds, and to these items please fill out the 11 pound package, omitting vitamin pills, shaving soap, cookies, with as large quantities as permitted of boullion cubes, cheese, powdered milk, chocolate, razor blades, banana flakes, sugar, meat extracts, hard candy, tomato flakes. Naturally, I realize you cannot get all of these items in the package but add what you can depending on the room, size, weight, etc, but we want every square inch of space and ounce of weight to send the most concentrated food possible.

Enclosed you will find next-of-kin label which Mr. Carter has filled in to send to his son, 2nd. Lt. Amon G. Carter, Jr., who is a prisoner of war in Oflag 64, Germany.

Please advise when the package is shipped and the total contents.
