Missing Officer DALLAS NEWS 6/3/44 Reported Prisoner

Capt. Hugo Fielschmidt, son of Mrs. Fannie Fielschmidt, 1730 Driscoll, who was reported missing in action in Italy by the War Department in April, has arrived in a German prison camp, according to word received Friday by his mother.

While no official report of his capture has reached Dallas, the message that Captain Fielschmidt is a prisoner of war came in a letter from Lt. Amon Carter Jr. to his father, Amon Carter, Fort Worth newspaper publisher.

In his letter from a German camp where he also is a prisoner, Lieutenant Carter reported that the Dallas captain and 100 other officers had reached his camp on April 23. He wrote that all the newly arrived prisoners were in good physical condition.

Captain Fielschmidt was a practicing dentist here before receiving his commission in the Army Dental Corps March 10, 1941. He has been overseas two years.

His wife lives in Boston, Mass.
