Harwell, who was killed by a bomb in China April 28th, when Japs attacked his field, when I read the news report that you were to receive a certified copy of his "Purple Heart" citation, I had an impluse to express to you my sympathy in the less of your son as well as say that I understand your pride in his courageous achievement as a defender of his country.

I, too, have a son in the service in fact, he is now a prisoner of war intemed in
a prison camp in Germany. Because of this, I know
something of the sorrow you are asked to face. Certainly, if there could be any consolation it would
be only the fact that his patriotic spirit prompted him,
without evasion, to enter the service and do his share
of the fighting to preserve the "American way" of life.
We are proud with you that it was your son's privilege
to die for his country.

May you be given the courage and strength to bear this sorrow as all of us who have loved ones in the armed service must be willing to sacrifice to the utmost if we are to preserve the liberties of our country.
