My dear General:

On my return to the city I found your letter of May 15 as well as your recent letter informing me that the International Red Cross officially informed your Prisoner of War Information Bureau that Lt. Amon Carter, Jr. 0402537, is a prisoner of war in Prisoner of War Camp Oflag IX AZ,

Please accept my thanks for this information, although I had previously received it from the Adjutant General's Office in Washington. At the same time, it was nice and thoughtful of you to send me the communication. I recall having had the pleasure of introducing Amon Jr. to you in Buckingham Palace on Thanksgiving afternoon, November 26 in London.

We have had two letters and three post cards from him since he was placed in the camp which is located at Rotenberg, 24 miles southeast of Kassel. In fact, I was concerned regarding the flood damages caused by the Allied bombings and asked the Red Cross to cable Geneva for information. Later they informed me that the camp was above the dam instead of below it. I hope this camp escapes the Allied bombing raids. The camp contained 141 American Army Officers and 11 doctors and about 400 British Officers. Most of them had been there since the fall of France. Incidentally, Amon Jr. sent General Hartle a card as a matter of precaution and the General cabled the Adjutant General in Washington who wired me the message to Fort Worth. It was nice of the General to do this, which I promptly acknowledged by cable.

I hope you will give my kindest regards to your associates whom I had the pleasure of meeting during my stay in England. It was tough about General Andrews and Colonel Morrow Krum as well as the others in the party. With best wishes, I am
