

Artilleryman Reported Missing After Battle



FORT WORTH, Texas, March 11.

—Lieut. Amon G. Carter Jr. has been missing in action since Feb. 14, his father, Amon Carter, publisher of the Star-Telegram, was advised Thursday in a telegram from Major Gen. J. A. Ulio, Adjutant General. A field artillery officer with an armored division, his unit was in action around Sbeitla, central Tunisia, on that date.
