in having it in his collection.

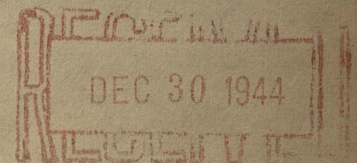

# Steel Output le Homeless

## *Artilleryman Reported Missing After Battle*



LIEUT. AMON CARTER JR.

FORT WORTH, Texas, March 11. —Lieut. Amon G. Carter Jr. has been missing in action since Feb. 14, his father, Amon Carter, publisher of the Star-Telegram, was advised Thursday in a telegram from Major Gen. J. A. Ulio, Adjutant General. A field artillery officer with an armored division, his unit was in action around Sbeitla, central Tunisia, on that date.

Lieutenant Carter, a graduate of Culver Military Academy, was a reserve officer and was called to active duty in July, 1941; trained at Fort Knox, Ky., and for several months prior to the landing in North Africa was stationed with the contingent of United States troops in North Ireland and England. He reached his twenty-third birthday last December. In addition to being a graduate of Culver, he had attended the University of Texas until he went into the service.
