**Texas Publisher's
Son Reported Still
Safe In Nazi Camp**

LOS ANGELES, April 25. (AP)—
Second Lt. William R. Swanson, 30,
who escaped from a German prison
camp, said today that Amon G.
Carter, Jr., son of the publisher of
the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, was

still safe, although a prisoner,
when Swanson last saw him about
January 30.

The Germans were attempting to
move back inmates of Oflag 64,
prison camp in the Polish corridor,
ahead of the advancing Russians,
Swanson said.

"Two groups of about 100 each
were taken out by train, and Amon
may have been with one of them,"
he added, "but I think he was in

the group that was marching. I
understand they were taken to the
Luckenwalde camp about 20 miles
south of Berlin."

Swanson said prison camp rations
consisted of "potatoes, a little bread
and soup" and that "Red Cross
packages were the savings factor"
although he lost 30 pounds.

Second Lieutenant Carter, an
artillery officer, was captured in
Africa.
