Your letter of May 30 has been received during Mr. Carter's absence and since I am the ninety-ninth assistant secretary, general flunky, office boy and what-have-you, I am taking the liberty of giving you a little information about Amon Junior as well as enclosing clippings which will give you more about his having been released.

Lt. Carter was flown back to this country and taken to Washington for questioning by the Intelligence Department. They kept him there about a week and then he arrived home last Saturday. Naturally, he looks older, his hair is thinner, he had lost quite a lot of weight and is quite nervous; however he looks far better than we anticipated considering the ordeal he had experienced. His mental attitude is perfect and he still has a sense of humor, so with rest and plenty of nourishing food, he will soon be himself.

Mr. Carter arrived in New York a week later than Amon and is still in New York and expected home in another week. I am sure that he will have many interesting things to tell us about his trip to Europe. Your letter will be brought to his attention as soon as he returns and I know he will appreciate the interest you have shown concerning Amon Junior.
