# Publisher Near Prison When Son Is Liberated

FORT WORTH, May 3.—When word came to Fort Worth yesterday that Lt. Amon Carter, Jr., a prisoner of war for over two years, had been liberated by the Russian advance, his father was not here to receive it. Instead, he was within a few miles of the camp 50 miles south of Berlin where his son was freed.

Amon Carter, publisher of The Star-Telegram and one of the world's most colorful newspapermen, is a member of the committee sent to Europe to investigate Nazi atrocities. Members of Congress, publishers, radio men and government officials made up the party that visited the concentration camps at the request of General Eisenhower.

Friends of Mr. Carter were not sure even last night that the publisher knew his son was free.

"He's somewhere in Germany, but we haven't been able to locate him," said Jim Record, managing editor of The Star-Telegram. "However, he is expected back in Paris tomorrow, and word is waiting for him there."

Lieutenant Carter, a field artillery officer with an armored division, was captured near Faid Pass in North Africa Feb. 14, 1943. He was reported missing in action, and for several months his family had no word from him. Then came the news that he was a prisoner in Germany.

He is reported to be in the Luckenwalde camp south of Berlin, which was overrun by the Russians recently. The prisoners were instructed to remain there until arrangements could be made for their transfer to American lines.

Three of the prisoners, apparently released to help make these arrangements, reported to American officials that young Carter was alive and well. The Associated Press quoted Lt. Henry N. Crellin of Springfield, O., one of the trio, as saying:

"Carter was in charge of distributing Red Cross parcels, and was staying in the Luckenwalde camp in compliance with the senior American officer's order that prisoners stay there until arrangements are made for them."

Lieutenant Carter is the only son of the publisher.
