Dear Mrs. Rodgers:

In reply to your letter of March 15, please be advised that I received the same information concerning Mrs. Whitaker in Paris having been advised that her son had been liberated and that "all officers of Oflag 64 were in Moscow." Upon receipt of the rumor, our News Department contacted Mrs. Whitaker who advised that she did not receipt the message but that her brother did. After several days it was possible to contact the brother who advised that he did not receive the message but that it had come from his wife. After a week or ten days, it was finally learned that no such message had arrived but merely the usual official notice of liberation with no mention of any other person.

I have also been informed that these boys were moved out in platoons, according to their classification, so the fact that your son's roommate has been liberated and ~~is~~ has not, would be of no significance.

Every day information is received that someone has had official notice that their boys have been liberated; however, nothing has been received about my son as well as many others, so all we can do is hope and pray that they will soon be heard from.
