Letter to Mrs. Roosevelt from Basil O'Comnor, Chairman American Red Cross for Mrs. Stuart C. Welch 267 Delaware Avenue, Buffalo, New York

January 13, 1945

My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

I have delayed some days in answering your letter of January 1st because our Prisoners of War Section cabled to Geneva in order to have the exact picture regarding supplies shipped to Oflag 64 during the last quarter of 1944.

The answer to this cable has just come in and I am attaching herewith two tables showing the amount of goods shipped month by month to Oflag 64 during October, November, and December 1944.

As the strength of this camp, according to the last reports, was about one thousand officers, you can see that rather substantial amounts of goods have been shipped. In particular, you will note that 19,420 standard food parcels, of eleven pounds each, were shipped to Offag 64 during the last quarter of 1944.

The number of our prisoners of war in Europe has recently increased very rapidly. On the other hand, as you know, the Marseille-Rhone Valley-Switzerland railroad line, over which all of our goods previously moved, was cut off for four months this summer during the hostilities in France. Fortunately, we had anticipated and accumulated substantial reserves in Switzerland which enabled our men in the camps in Germany to be served all through the summer months. Actually, except in one or two exceptional instances, and then only briefly, the service of supply to our prisoners in Germany has been continuous. Goods are moving into all the camps now in substantial quantities, both from Switzerland and from Sweden over a new route via Goteborg which was opened last fall.

Few people realize the intricate task of our War Prisoners Section in the American Red Cross. They have not only moved the goods on schedule from here, but far ahead of schedule. Mrs. Holmes has told you recently part of the story. Here is the chain between the American Red Cross and an American prisoner:

- 1) American Red Cross
 - to
- 2) International Red Cross
 - to
- 3) German Red Cross
 - win
- 4) German Railways (under constant bombardment)
- 5) American Camp Leader in the German prison camp.

We actually control only the first link in the five above links, in getting aid from this country to a prisoner of war. However, our Prisoners of War Relief Section is constantly on the alert to influence and activate the functioning of the remaining four links. For fifteen months without a break and on the word of Colonel Drake (formerly American Camp Leader in Oflag 64) and of our own statistics, every American in Oflag 64 has received one food parcel a week.

It is to be regretted that there was a temporary break in the food parcel supply to Oflag 64 in November. However, we have definite confirmation now that the men at

this camp are again regularly receiving their packages.
