old, Hollywood's unrealistic portrayal of love can lead to false expectations and disillu sionment.
The predictable path of silver screen romances is a linear
progression. In that progresprogression. in that progres-
sion, a couple will travel from point A, where their desire
is just beginning to spark, is just beginning to spark,
to point B, where their por to point B, where their passion for one another is completely ablaze
After years of learning from After years of learning from the media follow this linear path. But, as we should well know, Hollywood does not equal
