Ironically, I think lessons learned in the classroom are less obvious than

tudents have an expectation of the knowledge they'll gain in a class and shut down to the idea of learning any ther way.
There are two opportunities to learn in the classroom: knowledge, which is edge that may be completely unrelated oo the subject. In college, perhaps the most important learning experience is that in which you learn how to bridge gaps between arenas,
social, intellectual, etc.
In the "real world," life isn't divided into subjects, and you don't receive separate grade for each one: If you screw up, you get a big fat zero for the seize the opportunity to learn more than just what were asked to.

do this. First, try to find similarities between matter, ideas, time period or people dis cussed. Even if you come to no fruitful conclusions, it's a useful mind exercise.

The band is best known for the short comedy skits that first started airing on HBO in the late
1990s.
"Tenacious D in. The Pick of "Tenacious D in: The Pick of
Destiny" sets out to portray how the band got its start It begins in the early 1990 s with a young boy named Jack
Black - although he preferred to go by JB instead - who left his home in Kickapoo, Mich., and traveled cross-country to Hollywood, Calif. in hopes of becom-

It becomes abundantly clear very quickly that Gass actually knows next-to-nothing about the music business. The one thing band is that Gass can lay down some wicked guitar licks and JB knows how to wail like a fullfledged superstar. The name Tenacious D came dropped his pants to reveal his birthmark. When placed side-byside, they spell out Tenacious D. The band's first appearance is
