about why women earn less money than men Are they less deserving? Do the maiority of women choose lower-paying jobs than men? Or do they just fail to negotiate their salaries with employers, such as sociology professor Jean Giles-Sims suggested?
nations, but none of them would be right. The truth is sexism still exists in our society. According to an article in today's Skiff, 13 percent of graduating TCU seniors surveyed reported earning annual incomes of $\$ 80,000$ them were men.
Granted, some of the earlier theories explaining this inequity in pay between genders do help to explain the phenomenon.

of females surveyed graduated from the
