Golden Years Club Shung Rocking

Who said they're "retired?" Dr. Samuel Ward Hutton, 74. six years ago began a second career as general secretary for the Texas Convention of Christian Churches a month after leaving the TCU administative

His office is across the street from the university campus, where he received his B.A. degree in 1911, his B.D. degree in 1931 and where he spent 27 years as assistant professor in Brite College of the Bible and as registrar.

A Disciples of Christ minister for 50 years, he also devotes one Sunday a month delivering the sermons at the Christian Church in Palo Pinto.

AND SAMUEL P. ZIEGLER, 78, chairman of the TCU art department from 1925-1953, is hard at work on his memoirs and adding to his extensive col-

lection of paintings and sketches. A vast collection of art picturing TCU's history and personnel from 1918 through 1948, portraits of composers and interpretations of their works used when Ziegler was cellist with the Pro Arte String Quartet here, and his artistic impressions of the works of Edgar Allen Poe, including "The Pit and the Pendulum," represent but a few of the subjects he has treated pictorially. Mrs. Mothershad began her career in the TCU Library in 1933 and retired seven years ago after 15 years as chief librarian.

THIS TRIO - and 57 other active senior citizens including musicians, writers, school teachers, administrators, business men and housewives over 60 are members of the Golden Years Fellowship sponsored by University Christian Church since 1955.

and spring.

GYF's oldest member, 94-yearold George T. Cope, retired from his work as a real estate dealer at 82 and devotes much of his time now to his garden, which includes a corn crop; work for Precinct 81, in which he has been active since 1921, and composing verses written especially

Cope, a graduate of the University of Texas Law School, was a practicing attorney here before entering the real estate business, and has been active in precinct politics since 1892 in Briscoe County.






