Your letter received sometime ago, regarding the matter of Will Rogers appearing in Shreveport in connection with the unemployment situation.

Incidentally, I have already answered one or two letters as well as a telegram explaining the fact that Mr. Rogers had already worked out his itinerary for Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. Meantime, I have suggested to him that it would be a fine thing to go to Shreveport if he possibly can as soon as he finishes in Arkansas. I would be delighted to assist you in anyway possible, but frankly I think it is a question of the time Mr. Rogers will have to devote to the matter. He is covering thirteen cities in Texas and we have had urgent requests from over twenty-five. He is scheduled to make eighteen towns in Oklahoma in one week, so you can see the problem he is confronted with, bearing in mind he has only had three weeks leave of absence from his picture work in California.
