I have noticed several articles in the paper recently about your son. The latest was the news of him being a prisoner. Also that he was an artillery officer.

I have a son-in-law in North Africa we haven't heard from since the 14<sup>th</sup> of February. He is also in the artillery and I was wondering if by comparing notes we could find something about him. He is Leearl B. Kinnaird, private, Co. B. 7<sup>th</sup> F. A. Bn. The APO no was One. He was drafted here last May. Trained for two months at Fort Sill. Okla. Spent three weeks at Indiantown Gap. Pa. and was in England by the 15<sup>th</sup> of August. Soon after the Americans went to N. Africa we heard from him regularly.

until lately and the last letter came  
the 14<sup>th</sup> of February. We haven't re-  
ceived any official notice of any  
thing happening to him but are  
just worried. Would you mind writ-  
ing me your sons Company and  
how you have found out where  
he is.

I have a son at A + M. a senior.  
He is Cadet-Captain this year and is  
in the Army since March 22. He  
will report to Fort Benning. Ga in May.  
Drummond Slover at Texas Christian  
is my oldest son and will report to  
the Marines in June. I have a daugh-  
ter, Adell Slover, a student nurse, at  
the City-County hospital. The girl,  
whose husband I am asking about,  
is home with me and working at  
Southland Paper Mills, and I have  
been in the County Clerk's office for  
several years.

I sincerely hope and pray our sons  
will soon be returned to us.
