I was very happy to receive your letter today about Amon, Jr. As you know from my previous letters, we were much disturbed originally about him, much relieved to learn that he was not a casualty, and now happy to hear of his well-being, even though fate has placed him temporarily in German hands, through no fault of his own.

I know that you, too, while much relieved, are still anxious; but I feel that there can be no real cause to worry. I can appreciate his desire for extra food because I know what a literal Godsend to prisoners are the packages which the loving and willing hands of Britain's women are continually making up and sending to them.

We often speak of you, of the time you were here, and of our happy trip home. I trust all is going well with you and that one of these days, some day, you may all be united again.
