My dear Admiral:


Your letter of June 30th, received and I appreciate the comments therein concerning Amon Junior and the fact, as you say, he is temporarily in German hands, through no fault of his own.

Meanwhile, I received two letters from him - one dated May 5th and the other May 20th, which arrived in Fort Worth June 21st. I thought you might be interested in reading them and am, therefore, sending photostatic copies along to you. In one of his previous letters he made the inquiry as to how he could pay his income tax and I wrote him that I was having difficulty in solving that problem for myself and I presumed his case would have to wait until after the War and he has an opportunity to come home.

Things seem to be going better. We are all delighted and happy and everyone here is doing his utmost to render every assistance and cooperation possible.
