Dear Lt. Simmons:

Thank you very much for your letter Of february 9th advising that you had received a card from Amon Junior dated December 20th. At that time, your card was the latest information we had received from Amon Junior.

Meanwhile, last week letters dated
December 14th, 18th and 25th were received and another
friend of Amon's wrote that a letter dated December 31st,
had arrived. In these letters he seemed quite cheerful
and it relieved some of the arriety I have felt for
his welfare for it is known that they had no Red Cross
or personal food parcels for more than two months. In
fact, December 13th was the first they had received
for two months. His letters were depressing when they
had no food, no sight of food and the severe winter
on hand with insufficient clothing and fuel to keep
warm.

Then in addition to this handicap these camps were moved, marched through the snow and, ice, to Luckenwalde about thirty miles South of Berlin to Stalag 3-A. This past Saturday information was received from the Provost Marshal General that as of first week in February the members of Oflag 64 were still on the move west but the Department did not know where.

You can well imagine how disturbed we are over the safety of these boys, but all we can do is wait, hope and pray that they will come through all right. Meantime, keep writing to Amon Junior as I know he will get a lot of pleasure out of your letters and having you keep him up to date on the 91st. His address is the same, wherever he may be.

Again, I appreciate hearing from you and like to be able to give Amon Junior any information evailable about his friends.
