Dear Mr. Carter,

After being seperated from my unit for about a month on some special work, I returned a few days ago to find your letter of May 12th. I was indeed glad to hear from you, and especially to get the details of Amon Jr's. experiences from the enclosed copies of his letters, Capt. Pirnie's and yours. Of course the greatest news to all of us is that he is safe, well and healthy. His were the most unusual experiences I have heard of in connection with that battle, and it was too bad that he had such bad luck after fighting so hard to return - he must have lost the "good-luck Crown" you gave us in England.

I understand that the only way we can write to prisoners in Germany now is to send our letters to civilians in the U. S. to mail, to prevent giving

identity or location of our units.
So I will write Amon Jr. and
send it to Mary to forward.

The last great roundup in
Tunisia was very exciting and
I'm sorry Amon Jr. missed the
show - wish you had been there
too. We evened the score for
our previous disasters, although
it takes many Nazis to equal
one American.

As mentioned in my previous
letter, Col. Hains has returned
to the U.S., but I have written
him and conveyed your message.

I expect to see Major
Weidemann in a few days
and will show him the copies
of Amon's communications.

I appreciate receiving the
photographs of Amon Jr. en-
closed with your letter. We
are hoping that it will not
be long until we completely
whip Germany and free our
friends and comrades over

Now that the preliminaries
are over we are rarin' to get
on with the main bout.

Please give my regards
to Mr. North, Mr. Record and
Frank Reeves, and to Amon
Jr. the next time you write
him.
