Dear Colonel:

Your letter of July 5th received and I was delighted to hear from you and to know that you had received my letter enclosing a copy of one of Amon Junior's letter, since which time they have moved him to a new camp in Poland in a little village called Schubin, about 100 miles South of Danzig, camp Oflag 64.

There are about 200 American Officers at this camp. Incidentally, there are nine officers from Amon's outfit including Col. Algers and Col. Waters.

I am enclosing, herewith, a copy of Amon's letters of July 4th and 19th which I thought might be of interest to you and you may pass them along to other boys who may have known Amon Junior.

Everyone is getting along fine where. I see Mary occasionally and your father quite frequently as well as your mother.

I wrote Colonel Hains a letter and have not as yet had a reply. In fact, I have invited both he and General Ward to come up sometime and spend a weekend with me. I presume you know where they are near Temple. I am not sure whether I told you that General Ward was up and had lunch with me on one occasion. I told him I had heard from you, Major Weidemann, Col. Hightower, Captain Malless, Captain Pirnie and others. I also had a letter recently from Colonel Summerall.

Mary has sent Amon Junior a letter. I told Amon that I had just received letters from you and Colonel Hightower. I also had a letter from Lt. Col. C. B. Brewster who said he had had a chance to see you for a few minutes.

I hope you are fine and everything is working out to your liking. We are delighted to see matters moving like they are. I am sorry I could not tell Amon Junior some of the things you said in your letter - in fact all of the letters I received have indicated that all of his buddies are working as fast as possible to get him home.
