Our hearts are broken but I feel that it might help if we could

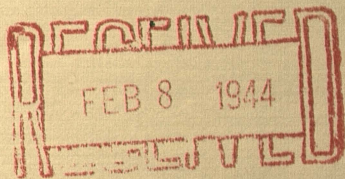
know the date and the true cause

It is with deep regret that I am writing to confirm the recent telegram informing you of the death of your son, Captain Richard H. Torrence, Jr. O-407, 588, Infantry, who was previously reported a prisoner of war.

Information has now been received from the German Government through the International Red Cross stating that your son died in a German prisoner of war camp as the result of apoplexy.

I realize the burden of anxiety that has been yours and deeply regret the sorrow this report brings you. May the knowledge of his brave and honorable service in defense of his home and country be a source of sustaining comfort to you.
