Dear Sergeant:

Your card of March 21st received, advising me that my son, Lt. Amon Carter, jr., had passed through your camp.

It was exceedingly nice of you to send me the card which I appreciated very much. He is now located in a new camp, Oflag 64, and I have just received a letter from him dated July 19th stating he is fine and in good spirits. I am sure the Germans are taking good care of all the Allied prisoners in good shape and I hope that all of you will adjust yourselves to the conditions which exist and try and treat your guards and captors with the same courtesy and consideration as you would like to receive under similar circumstances. I am sure they are doing everything they can for you, the same as we are in this country are doing for the German and Italian prisoners.

When the war is over and you get back in this country and have an opportunity we would certainly be glad to see you and buy you a nice big double porterhouse steak, with frenchfried potatoes and a big pot of coffee with some hot biscuits and plenty of butter thrown in for good measure; then wind it up with a nice stack of hot cakes and maple syrup.

I am writing Lt. Carter that I heard from you and sending him a copy of my letter to you. I am sure he appreciates your sending me a card and I again want to thank you.

I hope you are well and fine and will make the best of everything.
