This statue is complete, in place on the grounds of the buildings named for Will, waiting the appropriate occasion for its unveiling.

I know the President was a great admirer and old friend of Will's. If, because of his affection for him, he should take time out on his Texas trip to unveil a statue of him in the city and amid surroundings he loved, it would be a tribute all friends of Will throughout the nation would greatly appreciate.

I notice his schedule calls for the ceremonies
