Dear Sam,

Naturally I presume the President has been tied-up with the steel strike and has probably not gotten around to the Tideland Bill. I don't think <sup>he</sup> ~~has~~ ever heard as much criticism of the administration as on the manner in which the steel strike has been handled. The arrogant action of the Wage Stabilization Board is a good indication that the C. I. O., seems to be taking over our government.

The New York Times had an editorial on April 25, asking the President to veto the Tideland Bill and I have written Arthur Sulzberger the publisher a letter, a copy of which I enclose herewith; if you have time I would like to have you read it. The Times is a good newspaper but they are certainly 'off their base' in their facts concerning the Tidelands. We are reproducing, in the Star-Telegram, a copy of my letter to the Times.
