"Somebody was inspired when they founded the 4-H Club," said Will Rogers in his daily column which ap-peared in The Banner in a special wire November 19, 1934. The management of The Banner was so im-pressed with the special feature that some 1,800 posters were printed from it and mailed to county agri-cultural agents throughout Tennessee for distribution to 4-H Clubs in the State. The poster was so popular that James G. Stahlman, publisher of The Banner, sent one to Mr. Rogers with his compliments. The humor-ist was quick to reply, and thanked Mr. Stahlman for using his "junk." The letter was written on a telegram form. Note the characteristic phrasing and spelling and the postscript.
