## PACKER AID IS DENIED BY DELEGATION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—A delegation of Detroit women representing housewives striking against high prices of meat demanded of Secretary of Agriculture Wallace today that the Government make an immediate investigation of the packers, and bring about a 20 per cent reduction in all meat prices.

Mrs. Mary Zuk, chairman of the delegation, insisted on a direct answer from Wallace, who walked out of the meeting after telling them that the unprecedented drought was chiefly responsible for the meat situation.

Mrs. Zuk branded as a "dirty lie" a statement she attributed to Representative Cannon, Democrat, Missouri, that the Detroit meat strikers were being paid by the packers. The delegation left for Capitol Hill to try to see Cannon and also for a conference with Representative Dingell, Democrat, Michigan.

When Wallace entered the hearing, held in the office of Dr. Calvin Hoover, consumers counsel of the AAA, and found reporters present, he said:

"Is it customary to have gentlemen of the press present at meetings of this sort? I do not think we can have a frank discussion on a matter of this kind with the reporters present."

Mrs. Zuk retorted: "I think the whole world wants to know what we are doing. Every housewife who has to buy meat knows what we are doing."

SEATTLE, Aug. 19 (AP).—Speeding south toward California after a stop of less than three hours here, the bodies of Will Rogers and Wiley Post left here at 11:53 a. m. in a Douglas air transport liner, piloted by William Winston, Texas flier.

Pilot Joe Crosson had flown them here from Vancouver, B. C.

Winston planned to make only one brief stop on the last lap of the funeral plane—that at Alameda to refuel.

The plane landed at Boeing Field, the municipal airport, in the southern part of the city. Without stopping his motor after the plane had come to a halt, Pilot Crosson taxied it into a United Air Lines hangar at the side of the field.

The hangar was completely surrounded by state patrolmen, city police and Marine Corps reservists.

A crowd of persons, some of whom had remained at the airport all night, were at the field.

Within the hangar, Col. Clarence Young, Pacific Coast manager of Pan-American Airways, and Amon G. Carter of Fort Worth, Texas, personal representative and close friend of the Rogers family, were among the group awaiting the plane's arrival.

Earlier, three morticians had arrived at the airport and had gone into the hangar.

A group of civic representatives, among them W. W. Conner, governor for Washington State of the National Aeronautics Association, and Rudolph Block, secretary for Mayor Charles L. Smith, were at the field.

Crosson's 100-mile flight from Vancouver was through the early morning haze.
