Mrs. J. B. Hamilton Head of Women's Division in Rogers Organization Here

Selection of the general committee of the women's division yesterday virtually completed the organization which will sponsor the Will Rogers Memorial Fund in Fort Worth and Tarrant County.

Mrs. J. B. Hamilton, president of the Junior League, will head the women's division, with Mrs. H. T. Floyd Jr., former president of the Junior Women's Club, Mrs. Homer H. Sloan, president of the Euterpean Club, and Mrs. Walter N. Hanney, former treasurer of the Fort Worth Federation of Women's Clubs, associate chairmen.

Tellers at the Continental National, First National and Fort Worth National Banks and the Union Bank and Trust Company today will begin accepting subscriptions for the memorial fund, as will the Fort Worth Press, The Fort Worth Star-Telegram and the headquarters in the clubroom of The Star-Telegram Building.

All subscriptions will be acknowledged in the newspapers and reported to the Will Rogers Memorial Commission, which is headed by Vice President John N. Garner, with headquarters in New York.

With the exception of finance and publicity committees, the Fort Worth-Tarrant County organization for the fund is now completed.

The finance committee will be announced today and the publicity committee at a meeting of the Fort Worth Advertising Club Wednesday at the Worth Hotel.

A meeting of all committees, scheduled for 3 p. m. today, has been postponed until the same hour tomorrow because of the absence

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500 New Workers Urged by Chairman For Chest Drive

A plea for 500 additional workers to take the field today in the Community Chest campaign was made yesterday by A. L. Shuman, general chairman. Shuman said he hoped the new workers will be at the report luncheon today at the Blackstone Hotel to obtain cards and be assigned territories.

"Every dollar of the \$114,234.09 balance of the chest budget of \$304,744.17 must be obtained," Shuman said, "to meet the actual needs of underprivileged neighbors during the coming year.

"The citizens of Fort Worth are able to make the necessary contributions if they can just be seen and told of the critical need that faces the social welfare agencies of the community. The campaign must be continued until the last dollar is raised.

In a proclamation issued by Governor Allred, Nov. 4 is designated as Will Rogers Day. The proclamation also urges all Texans on that day to reflect upon the fine, clean manhood of Will Rogers, the life of service he lived and the good he did.

The proclamation suggests that all school and civic organizations conduct suitable exercises in memory of Will Rogers and urges contributions to be made to the memorial fund.

Rogers died. Idol of America, beloved by all who knew him his untimely passing brought a greater sense of individual loss and sorrow to every American citizen than any man who has ever commanded the attention or affection of the people.

In the words of Rev. J. Whitcomb Brougher Sr., who officiated at the Will Rogers memorial services in Glendale, Cal.:

"There are many hills, but only here and there a great towering Mt. Shasta; There are many streams, but only here and there a great Mississippi;

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There are many trees, but only here and there a great Sequoia gigantea;

There are many echoes, but only now and then an original voice;

There are many musicians, but only now and then a Mendelssohn or a Mozart;

There are many politicians, but only now and then a great statesman;

There are many people, but only now and then an outstanding individual."

The Nation still is stunned and sorrowful. It is impossible to realize that Will Rogers is really gone from us.

Will Rogers needs no monument. He built his own monument, he wrote his own epitaph in the hearts and affections of people from every walk of life. He was the greatest apostle of sunshine, of joyous humor, of fellowship, the world has ever known. He still lives because his work lives. "To live in mankind is far, far more than to live in a name."

To perpetuate his memory, to fittingly attest a Nation's love for the ideals Will Rogers represented, a nationwide movement is under way. It is headed by outstanding citizens everywhere who have agreed to give unselfishly of their time and means, in order that a proper foundation for service to human-kind may be permanently established. Every man, woman and child, from the highest to the lowest walks of life, will be given an opportunity to participate.

As but a small part of the program, on Monday, Nov. 4, every bank in the Nation will open special "Will Rogers Memorial" accounts. Every man, woman or child who has ever chuckled at the homely philosophy of Will Rogers, whose life has been made happier, who has been inspired by the cleanliness of his example, who has hungrily searched for his daily news contribution, who has seen him on the screen, who has pressed forward in surging crowds for a personal glimpse of him, will be given an opportunity to make a deposit, quietly, without publicity of any kind, from a single dime to the limit of their means.

I think Will Rogers, if he knew that all who loved him are determined to establish a permanent foundation to his memory, would prefer contributions of 25 cents from 15,000,000 people to a few larger sized donations.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JAMES V. ALLRED, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby set aside and dedicate

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 4TH
as

WILL ROGERS DAY.

I urge all Texans on this day to reflect the fine, clean manhood of Will Rogers, the life of service he lived, the good he did. I suggest that all of our schools and civic clubs conduct suitable programs and exercises in memory of our great philosopher humorist.

I especially urge that all of us contribute of our bit to the Will Rogers Memorial Fund.

DIES AT HER RESIDENCE

Mrs. Frances M. McGlothlin, 90, died at her residence, nine miles northeast of Arlington, at 4:10 p. m. yesterday. She had lived in Texas since 1878, coming here from Missouri with her husband, G. C. McGlothlin, who died in 1896.

Mrs. McGlothlin and her husband were in Fort Worth the year the Texas and Pacific Railroad started the line west from this city.

Survivors are four sons, W. P. McGlothlin of Fort Worth, B. F. McGlothlin of Dallas, A. G. McGlothlin of Grand Prairie, and J. T. McGlothlin of Shawnee, Okla.; one daughter, Mrs. W. Q. Seale of Dallas; 23 grandchildren and 27 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p. m. tomorrow at the Shady Grove Cemetery, north of Grand Prairie. M. H. Moore will officiate.

FUNERAL TODAY FOR ASPHYXIATION VICTIM

Funeral services for Leeton Woodruff, 16, who was asphyxiated when he fell into a gasoline tank car while playing at the M.-K.-T. crossing near his home Saturday, will be held at 11 a. m. today at the Mount Olivet Cemetery.

The youth died in a Gause-Ware ambulance en route to City-County Hospital after being pulled from the tank by Joe Hopkins, ambulance attendant. Hopkins was nearly overcome by the fumes when he leaped into the car after the boy.
