Mrs. Sutton who is affectionate-ly known as Resument's sculptor-

Mrs. Sutton who is affectionately known as Beaumont's sculptoring grandmother, came into artistic prominence less than a dozen years ago. After half a century of quiet, faithful service to her family, Mrs. Sutton began a career of her own when a bit of modeling clay assumed an interesting shape in her sumed an interesting snape in her hands with almost no effort at all.
