VAUGHT, SENATORIAL NOMINEE, VETERAN CAMPAIGNER FOR THE PARTY THAT HAS HONORED HIM

Jim Vaught, democratic nominee for the U. S. senate, is a veteran campaigner.

In every campaign since 1916 the Duke City attorney has stumped up and down the state for the democratic ticket.

Jumping from county to county, he has made friends in every nook of the state and is generally regarded as the "orator of the Sunshine State."

Despite the fact that Vaught has been in the thick of every political fight in the state for the past 12 years, the coming fall will mark the first time that he has taken the state field in behalf of his own candidacy.

Whether the slow Mississippi drawl and southern stories which have won such a definite place for him in New Mexico politics will be as effective in his own candidacy will soon be demonstrated as the campaign swings into full tilt in a few weeks.

Vaught came to New Mexico in 1912. He located at Deming and four years later was appointed assistant district attorney.

Named District Attorney

In the fall of 1915 he was elected district attorney and then began what is one of the most active law enforcement campaigns in the southwest.

Vaught began to clean out the cattle rustlers in the southern part of New Mexico. In his opening session he secured 200 indictments out of 205 cases presented.

Within five years the southerner had made Deming and its territory a better place to live in. He secured 15 convictions on first degree murder charges.

Foremost Lawyer

During the past 10 years the Albuquerque attorney has taken part in practically every major murder case in the state, getting convictions in the majority of them. He has generally been regarded as the foremost trial criminal lawyer in the state.

Vaught was born at Magnolia, Miss., July 18, 1884. After finishing his public school course he attended Centenary college at Jackson, La.

Starting as a bookkeeper in an ice plant, Vaught pored over law books at night and finally quit his job to attend law school.

NEW SUSPECTS IN LAMAR CASE

Oklahoma Bad Man Believed to Hold Clue

Floyd Jarrett, notorious Oklahoma "bad man," was in jail at Ardmore, Okla., today in connection with the robbery and may be sent to Colorado to tell what he knows of the daring hold-up. Jarrett has two brothers who police say may know something of the crime.

Meanwhile Colorado Springs, Denver and Lamar authorities continued to work on a "secret tip" which they believe may clarify the identity of the "killer gang."

NOMINEE BOB DOW SON OF AN OLD TIME NEW MEXICO PEACE OFFICER; BORN IN THE STATE

Bob Dow, the maybe next governor, is just about 40 years old, and by his own confession has been mixed up in politics since he was three years old.

Those first political friends of the cowboy attorney general, however, were cow hoes and once in a while, even at such a tender age, a calf or two.

The ridin' ropin' son-of-a-gun from Eddy-co, still has a picture his proud daddy had taken of him when he was five years old.

Bob had just completed roping a calf.

But when this Dow lad got to be growin' up, his father decided bein' a plain cow hand wasn't all his boy should be and he talked him into looking ahead to an education.

Leslie Dow, the father died when Bob was 11 years old. Les Dow was sheriff of Eddy-co. and died from the gun of an Eddy-co. bad man.

When Bob grew older and educated he got to be district attorney, helped to bring law and order to Eddy-co. and in a measure avenged upon the element of crime in his county the death of his father.

Dow later served in the legislature, then as assistant attorney general, and now is actively in the race for the governorship.

Acosta Under Bail; Levine Safe On His Way Back Home

Clerbourg, France, Sept. 5.—Bert Acosta was at liberty under bail today and will be tried later for his flight from Paris to Clerbourg in Charles A. Levine's monoplane, Queen of the Air.

The slow workings of the French courts may prevent him from obtaining a hearing in time to make a trans-Atlantic flight this summer.

Acosta will be tried on a charge of flying over a fortress and landing on a new field without permission. After some difficulty over his passport, Levine was escorted to the ship's tender by gendarmes and allowed to sail.

ROPING ATTORNEY GENERAL IS CHOICE OF PARTY TO HEAD TICKET THIS FALL

The democrats of New Mexico in sessions here Wednesday afternoon and evening selected Jim Vaught, Bob Dow and John Morrow for their major standard bearers in the coming fall campaign.

Dow was nominated the gubernatorial candidate at the evening session when Col. D. K. B. Sellers' boom failed to gain the anticipated strength, due in part to the previous nomination of Vaught.

Vaught wrested the nomination from Arthur Seligman on the first ballot in a spirited fight. He was named by acclamation on motion of Dave Chavez, representative for Seligman.

Juan Vigil, Taos-co, was nominated for the short term of the U. S. senate.

Congressman Morrow was renominated without opposition.

The air of gaiety which has been noticeably lacking in the deliberations of the democrats in state convention here for the first two days broke loose as the evening session was about to open.

Band Strikes Up

To the blare of bands, delegates were singing "Hail, Hail the Gang Is All Here" and "East Side, West Side."

The tension of the convention created by the Vaught-Seligman fight for the Senatorial nomination and the Dow-Sellers battle for the gubernatorial choice appeared to have broken and delegates were mingling and crowding good naturedly thru the hall.

Dow Banners Fly

Dow banners were flying and a demonstration for the roping cowboy swung into session shortly after 8 p. m.

Chairman Brice was unable to bring the session to order with the gavel as the Dow march continued.

Rumors of Withdrawal

Rumors were rife thru the convention that Col. Sellers would withdraw when the convention was called to order.

No definite information could be secured, however, as leaders of the Sellers forces appeared to be in the air and unable to agree on the course to be taken.

Many were known to favor his withdrawal and move for Dow's nomination by acclamation. Others wished to present his name so that Bernalillo-co might be given the opportunity to cast an honor ballot for him.

"We want Bob Dow," came cries from the marching delegates as Brice rapped for order.

Fall Into Line

Many who lacked Dow banners fell in line and the climb for the band wagon appeared to be quite general.

Judge Brice continued to rap for order, but was unable to quell the seething delegates.

Chaves Speaks

Dennis Chaves was introduced as a real Al Smith democrat and one who really represents Bernalillo-co.

"We are going to be rough. We are getting tired of having the rest of the state tell us who we are going to nominate in this county," Chaves said.

"Be Fair," Urges

"We want you to be fair and just with the democrats of Bernalillo-co," Chaves declared.

"We have nominated one man from Bernalillo-co. Mr. Vaught was nominated despite the fact that a majority of Bernalillo-co delegates were against him," Chaves said.

Chaves declared that 90 per cent of the class of democrats who went down the line for Hinkle are for Sellers.

Worth 2,000 More

"The man I am going to nominate is worth 2,000 more votes in Bernalillo-co than Jim Vaught," Chaves said.

"We have one candidate from this county, and we make the solemn pledge that the vote we give our candidate will be given the rest of the ticket," he stated.

"I wouldn't trade him for all the men the Club Politico can suggest," Chaves said.

"I am for Vaught and will support him whole heartedly but the Democrats of the county feel that Sellers ought to be nominated," Chaves said.

Scott Etter, Eddy-co, placed Bob Dow in nomination.

Dow is a native of Eddy-co and New Mexico, a man whose father died for New Mexico and Eddy-co, Etter said.

Represents All State

"The man I am going to nominate not only represents Eddy-co, but represents the whole state of New Mexico," Etter declared.

"The report that \$4,500 of republican money was deposited here to get him nominated is an absolute lie. We do not need republican money to put him over the top," Etter said.

"Bob Dow is known and liked in every village and every township in the state," Etter declared.

"Geographically, Dow's location is correct with relation to the rest

of the ticket thus far nominated," Etter said.

No Additional Advice

"This man, if elected governor, will not have to call in the additional advice that is necessary now," the speaker asserted.

Charles Gilbert of Roswell seconded Dow's nomination. He declared that Chaves' co's votes go for the Democratic nominee, whomever he may be.

Honest Administration

"We believe that as governor of this state he will see that the crooks of this state are prosecuted and will give us an honest administration," Gilbert said.

"We are for this man because he is of the people, brot up as a cow-puncher over on the Pecos river," Gilbert said.

"Endorse Bob Dow and you will never be sorry for it," Gilbert asserted in closing.

Second Dow

DeBaca-co seconded Dow's nomination and Dona Ana, Hidalgo, Lea, Lincoln and Luna counties followed with similar seconds.

Al Zinn, Gallup attorney, took the floor and declared that he had not been for Sellers until tonight.

Zinn for Sellers

"I want to talk to those who are more interested in winning an election than in nominating a personal friend," Zinn said.

"I am going to second the nomination of Colonel D. K. B. Sellers against my own best interests for the interest of the party," Zinn said.

Otero-co. seconded Dow. T. E. Mears of Roosevelt-co. took the floor to declare that if Bob Dow had not been born in New Mexico he would have moved here of his own accord.

Slept on Range

"Bob Dow has slept out on the range with his saddle for a pillow" Mears declared.

"He was not afraid then. He made himself an able lawyer and you elected him attorney general. He is not afraid now."

"When he is elected governor he will be the governor of Bernalillo-co. Bob Dow is not afraid of anything except the violation of his own conscience," Mears declared.

"Every citizen of the state will get a square deal if Bob Dow is elected," Mr. Mears declared.

COTTON GROWERS TO DISCUSS MARKETING

Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 5.—Methods for financing the south's \$1,500,000,000 cotton crop will be discussed here today at the final meeting of the two-day session of officials of 46 cotton growers' cooperative associations in the south and southwest.

Representatives of more than 115,000 cotton planters are attending the conference, called by Secretary of Agriculture Jardine to discuss orderly marketing of the southern staple. The sessions have been executive and little intimation of the topics discussed has been given out.

REGULARS WIN IN WISCONSIN

Governor Zimmerman Fails Decisively

Madison, Wis., Sept. 5.—Regular republicans and conservatives apparently had won a major victory in yesterday's primary, on the basis of latest returns today. The regular republican candidate for governor, Walter J. Kohler, had a commanding lead over Joseph D. Beck, progressive candidate.

Gov. Fred Zimmerman, running for re-election and a member of the old LaFollette faction, was left far in the rear. It was the first time in 33 years that a governor of Wisconsin failed to be elected for a second term.

However, Robert La Follette, son of "Fighting Bob," was successful in his effort for the nomination to the U. S. senate over George W. Mead, the "regular" republican candidate.

COLUMBUS ON BOOM ACCORDING TO MAYOR; RESENTS STORIES OF DEPRESSION IN HOME TOWN

Santa Fe, Sept. 5.—Frank Curns, special attorney for the state tax commission, is in Columbus today posting notices of the sale of property for delinquent taxes. Several hundred pieces of property are to be sold in what will be the largest tax sale in the history of the state.

An El Paso man has bid \$10,000 for the entire property and has posted \$1,000 as a sign of good faith.

The tax commission states that the plate glass alone in the buildings to be sold will amount to nearly \$5,000.

The population of Columbus has decreased considerably since the boom several years ago when it was frontier headquarters for U. S. troops in the Pershing punitive expedition into Mexico after Villa.

C. W. Powers, ex-mayor of Columbus, in a letter to the Tribune, states that reports appearing in the papers to the effect that Columbus is a dead town are erroneous. Mr. Powers says that the tax sale affects only outlying additions and does not apply to the city proper.

The village, he declares, is again about to boom, following discovery of gold within a few miles of the city limits.

"The population of Columbus is 400 instead of 37 as was ridiculously stated in reports sent out by the Associated Press of Santa Fe," he writes.

In denying this petition the commission cited a ruling of the interstate commerce commission giving every line the right to run one thru train.

Hugh Williams, commissioner, stated that a decision on the recent hearing on ginning rates at Las Cruces would soon be rendered.

TO SPEED WORK

Santa Fe, Sept. 5.—In order to expedite the building of the road from Tierra Amarilla south for 13 miles the highway department has requested the contractor to employ the big steam shovel which is at present being used on the job at Bluewater, highway officials announced Wednesday.

Residents near Tierra Amarilla are reported to be anxious to have the big hill on this road eliminated before winter sets in.

"Aerial golf" in which an aviator is partnered by a man on the ground, who puts the ball after the former has dropped it from the air as near the green as possible, has been played on a New York golf links.
