

To the Departmental Staffs:

Students who are conditioned in the Pre-junior Tests are being advised to do personal study to bring up the gaps, and to seek the advice of their teachers about what to study. (Any teacher may do this, but, of course, in harmony with the plans of the departmental staff).

This affords an excellent opportunity for teachers to advise the students in reading courses, etc., for study on their own, and to develop that qualification rather than the over-much reliance on the class routine for all initiation. When students come for help in this matter, we trust the teachers will meet them with interest and helpfulness, give them some practical guidance toward bringing up these deficiencies.

The next regular offering of the tests will be in December. For Seniors, however, special tests should be arranged in September, so they may clear themselves as early as possible. So far as time permits, some of these tests might be oral. If any department head---or teacher through the department head---advises that some student take a special test at any time, it should be arranged through the Dean's office, to keep the record straight.

The teachers can be of much helpfulness by taking a personal interest in this problem of the student. We hope the opportunity will be utilized.

We are endeavoring to put the initiative up to the students in this matter. But since the plan is yet new to the students, it would be well for the major and minor professors to inquire of their students about their status with the Pre-juniors, and to urge them to get off conditions at once, so their chances for graduation will not be jeopardized.
