I. A major in music on A.B. degree:

Major 30 s.h. in Music, (including: 11, 12, 41) of which 12 must be in 30's and 40's.

First Minor 18 s.h. a foreign language, English, philosophy, psychology, history.

Second Minor. Another of these or Education or Public School Music.

Required: The student must qualify by credit or test for entrance into the Freshman course in either piano, voice, or violin.

Not more than 42 s.h. may be credited in music courses.
Not more than 12 s.h. of applied music.

BACHELOR OF ARTS COURSE
Citizenship Group (Social Sciences)

In order to meet the needs of those who wish to pursue work in the Social Sciences, majoring in economics, government, history, or sociology, the following course of study is outlined. It is highly desirable that students majoring in the Social Sciences in both graduate and under-graduate work should take French or German as the required foreign language, since the most valuable foreign literature is available in these languages.

REQUIREMENTS FOR MAJORS IN ENGLISH:

Major -- English 11, 24, 50, and English electives to total 30 hours.

First Minor -- 18 semester hours in a foreign language, philosophy, history, sociology, public speaking.

Second Minor -- None required.

Prescribed -- Philosophy 34, history 21, French 21 or German 21.

REQUIREMENTS FOR MINORS IN ENGLISH:

Any student presenting English as a first minor will take English 11, 24, 139, and in English electives to total 24 semester hours. Any student using English as a second minor will present 18 semester hours including English 11 and 24.

All students expecting to major in Mathematics or Science should register for 12ab or 13ab in their freshman year, since they are prerequisites for all other mathematics courses.

Math 12ab

Prerequisite: Plane Geometry, 1 unit, Algebra, 2 units. No High School trigonometry.

Those students who need extra class help will be assigned to a five-hour section meeting at the same clock hour.

The standard college algebra and trigonometry, followed by a brief presentation of the elementary concepts of analytical geometry and calculus.

Math 13ab

Prerequisite: Plane Geometry, 1 unit, Algebra, 2 units, High School trigonometry, $\frac{1}{2}$ unit. All presenting High School trigonometry, who wish to take mathematics, must take this course instead of Mathematics 12ab. He may take 12ab upon the advice of the head of the department.

The content of the course is similar to Mathematics 12ab except that less time is given to the elementary principles of algebra and trigonometry.
