To the Departmental Staffs:

The Association of American Colleges is making an extensive study of the Comprehensive Examination (applying to the senior year, not, now the pre-junior) under Dr. Edward S. Jones. In making a report to them this year I found my information concerning our practice quite fragmentary. We have kept no especial records. We need these, and the purpose of this note is to request each staff to keep records this spring concerning these Comprehensive Tests to seniors. These points should be covered:

Time when given; length of period used; how much written and oral; how many teachers present at oral and any outside the staff; scope of tests (major subjects only, or others); chief aim of test; list of students taking; suggestions based on experience.

It will be recalled that the cabinet voted about three years ago to adopt the policy of requiring a comprehensive test in the major field for graduation, but left it optional with each department and the methods to be worked out by experience. -- Dean Hall
