Make sure that a certificate of credits is sent by the last school attended (high school or college) directly to the Registrar. No student will be considered for admission until this record is in the office of the Registrar. 3. All freshmen are required to devote all og the days, September 14, 15, 16, to the "Freshman Week" Program of organization. Contacts with the elevem activities mentioned above will be made on schedule within these three days. 4. The physical examination is free if taken during "Freshman Week". A fee of \$1.00 will be required of all who delay this beyond the time assigned for registration. 5. Freshmen who have already filled out the "Application Blank" will report to Senior Aides in groups of ten in line with instructions available at the 9:00 A. M. assembly, Friday, the 14th. Others will be assigned to groups at that time. 6. Courses for the first year are to be solected from the tables on pages of the 1934-35 C talog under guidance of Faculty Counselors assigned by interests expressed by students. LATE REGISTRATION
